7:00 PM – Supervisor opened meeting and Pledge of Allegiance

Supervisor said that once he built an airplane hangar that held fifty airplanes, he thought that was a big deal, but it wasn't; tonight, he has the honor of appointing Jim Janso as Chief of Police of the Town of Lloyd. He has known Jim for over 30 years and watched his career grow.

He invited Janso to the front to be sworn in.

Resolution made by Auchmoody seconded by Winslow to appoint James S. Janso as Chief of Police of the Town of Lloyd Police Department, from the Ulster County Civil Service List of Eligible, at no additional renumeration, effective February 1, 2020, and to authorize the Supervisor to sign the labor agreement.

The Board plans to open and close each public hearing this evening, leaving open for written, additional comments from the applicant or public until Monday, February 24, 2020.

There will be a special meeting on Wednesday, February 26, 2020 at 7:00 PM where the board will hopefully make its decision on each request.

He asked each speaker to keep their comments to 10 minutes or less, and members of the public to limit comments to 3 minutes or less.

Patti Brooks said she is here this evening with Steve Lawrence, 35-37 Rt. 9W LLC Inc. He received final approval on September 26, 2019 and entered into contract to purchase the property from the Deckers. He has hired a local builder and invested \$19,000.00 in materials for the addition. He has made a substantial investment and the only reason he purchased the property was because he received site plan approval from the planning board.

Lawrence said otherwise he would have relocated somewhere else.

Supervisor said for the record, they have planning board approval.

Dear Town of Planning and Zoning Board,

This letter is in regards to the public hearing which took place on November 21, 2019. Several neighbors voiced concerns in which we would like to address; 1) Landscaping appeared to be brought up by several neighbors. We intend to remove the four huge tree stumps in front, paint and repair the ramp which provide the main means of egress to and from the building, and we'll eventually adding a few trees across the front of the property for privacy and noise. A 6-foot Stockade fence will also be installed enclosing the property to provide privacy and to add additional noise cancelation for the daycare as well as for the neighbors located to the north and west of the property.

2) Several voiced concerns regarding children left without adequate supervision i.e; running from the building alone, escaping from the playground, wondering to close to the street, children being attacked by wild animals, and concerns over noise. NYS Office of Family and Children Services requires daycare facilities to operate in accordance to regulations set forth by the state to ensure health, safety, and well-being of the children enrolled in daycare programs. Adequate supervision is required at all times, ratios must be followed and adhered to in order to maintain safety of the children in our care. Random visits are done by a NYS Licensors to ensure programs are operating in accordance to the regulations set forth. Please find attach letter from our current neighbor regarding their experience with our daycare center in regards to noise.

NYS OFCS require a fenced in play area which should below, please find a copy of the playground schedule

that was also in question with the number of children outside at any given time.

Khattar Elmassalemah, an engineer with Praetorius and Conrad, said he has worked on this project for RTH. It is a unique 12,000 sq. ft. passive warehouse located on Upper North Road, with a green footprint, minimal impact on traffic, onsite sewer and close access to the town water main. It will disturb no more than one acre, and will be landscaped.

Cathy Hobbs, owner of RTH Holdings, stated that her business is a home staging design business. The proposed building is the first certified passive warehouse in North America. She has been a resident of Ulster County for eight years, and wants to locate her business here. She has 3.5 acres surrounded on three sides by orchards. The business will employ 5 to 10 people, and has partnered with SUNY New Paltz to have a robust internship program. The delay of this project is both personally financially devastating, and will have a huge negative impact on her business.

Patti Brooks, of Brooks & Brooks PC, gave a brief history of the funeral home. They have served the community for nearly 70 years, and would like to build a 40' x 50' addition to provide a more open environment to accommodate the residents of the Town of Lloyd and surrounding towns. The addition will reflect the architectural style of the building, and will not adversely affect the health, safety or welfare of the town residents. Nor will it generate additional traffic or noise, or negatively impact the surrounding properties. A delay in granting this waiver will cause great difficulty regarding the anticipated construction schedule of this project.

Stout wanted to clarify that there has been a pre-application meeting, but an application has not been filed yet. Patti indicated that that is correct. Stout asked if that is on hold pending the outcome of the waiver. Patty agreed.

Patti Brooks requested a moratorium waiver on behalf of P We Holdings LLC to allow them to proceed with the review and approval of their site plan application currently before the planning board. P We Holdings purchased three lots in 2018, and engaged the services of an architect, land surveyor and engineer to proceed with building design and site plan approval of a restaurant/catering facility. An application was submitted to the planning board in August 2019, and a lot line

revision was approved in December 2019. The applicant is anxious to proceed with the site plan. A delay will cause a financial hardship for the applicant as a significant amount of money has already been invested. The site is out of the primary area of concern the moratorium is addressing, and there are two points of access to this proposed facility; one at an existing traffic light, and a new right in, right out, off Rt. 9W, that the NYSDOT has already approved.

John Furst, attorney, is representing Mr. Sanderson, the owner of the Villages in the Hudson Valley, in front of the planning board. They have proposed a continuing care community to be located on the west side of 9W (on the hill behind the storage facility), and north of the Hudson Hills development. The town code for this type of development is CCRC – Continuing Care Retirement Community. It will include 212 independent living units, and a 145,000 sq. ft. assisted living and skilled care facility with 125 beds. There will also be recreational amenities consisting of green space, walking paths, swimming pool, tennis courts, and a community center with a library.

This project is designed for ages 62 and over.

The application was submitted to the planning board in March 2019. There have been multiple meetings, and modifications have been made based on the input from those meetings to address presented concerns.

They are seeking a waiver based on section 6 of the moratorium law. A previously submitted letter explains this in detail. Two affidavits, one from Mr. Sanderson, and another from Ron DeVito are being submitted to further show the financial hardship this delay is causing.

Concerning the second portion of section 6; lack of any adverse effects. This project will actually improve the quality of life for the town's residents. They are proposing a traffic light at Mayer Drive and 9W, and widening Rt. 9W to create left hand turn lanes.

Ron DeVito, of Concordia Senior Housing, stressed the importance of every community having adequate multi-level housing for seniors, especially in the town of Lloyd where there are 2531 seniors ages 62 and over, but only 169 beds in the two existing assisted living facilities. Neither of these facilities have a memory care unit.

In addition, skilled nursing services will be provided in their facility.

He has applied to HUD for financing, and is in jeopardy of losing that funding if this project gets delayed. If he loses this financing, he will not be able to proceed with the project. He urged the board to give careful consideration to their request for a waiver.

Tricia Chapman, a resident of Salk Drive, wanted to remind the board of the 179 residents that previously submitted their concerns regarding traffic, safety and lighting. She urged the board to take these concerns into serious consideration, and keep in mind what the original intent of the moratorium was for.

Furst and Brooks explained how traffic would flow in and out of each area. NYS has given approval to the proposed traffic light, widening of 9W, and new access directly off 9W into and out of the medical building.

Melanie Balstead said that the traffic and safety on Rt. 9W between the Hannaford traffic light and the Macks Lane traffic light is already dangerous, with multiple accidents just in the last six months. It is the norm to wait for three light changes to get from one to the other.

Lindsay Decker wanted to make sure the traffic light would be installed before the new homes/facilities would be occupied.

Susan Lindauer, of Mayer Drive, wanted to know exactly where off Mayer Drive you would be able to access the proposed independent living homes. Furst showed her on the diagram.

Sylvia Marion wanted to know how many local seniors would be able to afford the proposed housing.

Erin Hazen, representing Glidepath Power Solutions, said they are proposing an energy storage facility to be located off Lumen Lane near the intersection of Rt. 9W and Rt. 299. It will occupy approximately 2 acres of a 106-acre parcel, and will be sited to avoid viewshed concerns. This facility, along with three others, will more than double the energy storage capacity of renewables in the state. This project is consistent with the zoning requirements. It's a remotely controlled facility with only up to four vehicles per week required for performing routine maintenance. There would be no impact on local water, sewer, schools, traffic or lighting. Their deadline for beginning is rapidly approaching, and if the deadline can't be met, it is unlikely that they could proceed at a later date. They have received planning board and SEQRA approval. There are no other plans for the remaining acreage.

REPORT – Peter Bellizzi, President, Hudson Valley Rail Trail

Bellizzi reported that they had a successful 22nd WinterFest. He reported that he's in discussions with Jami Anson to do a joint Walktober Fest with the Walkway, and he's happy to announce that Jami has joined the rail trail board. Next year's WinterFest event will be held on the first Saturday in February.

REPORT – Leonard Auchmoody, Manager, Bob Shepard Highland Landing Park Auchmoody stated that he would like to put four more lights in the back of the parking lot, and two more 12' lights on the north end. That will light up the entire lot which will assist the police when they drive by. Also, the 28 new lights are only costing an additional \$10 per month to operate.

2. OLD BUSINESS

Supervisor said he met with Recreation Director; Frank Alfonso, Councilmember; Mike Guerriero, Councilmember Lenny Auchmoody, and Highway Superintendent; Rich Klotz at Berean Park. They decided to move forward with the tennis, pickleball, basketball courts. The first two courts look good, the third court needs work. In one week, Frank Alonzo and Richie Klotz were able to remove the fence and poles, and cut back all the brush, and then DiLorenzo Tree Service topped off the trees to let more light into that area to help prevent the growth of moss on the court. Alfonso spoke about all they've done to improve the park over the years. They anticipate paving by June.

Bellizzi said the scouts built a camp up there about nine or ten years ago, and scouts come from Connecticut to camp there.

Donna Deprose suggested that the park could be used for festivals and other events.
