- 1) I was interviewed by the "Times Union" and an article about the cemetery appeared in the Feb. 27 issue. The same article also appeared in the Poughkeepsie Journal the following day.
- 2) We are working to get all the pieces in place to allow visits by appointment in Spring.

Research on the local sites

- 1) Research on Franny Reese Park continues.
- 2) Krum Elbow – I've traced the owners of the site back to 1800 when Henry van Hoevenbergh, a Rev. War veteran bought the property and built a dock there. Joseph Corning, who bought the property in 1902, had all the roofs of the buildings painted red – so the name of the road leading to the site became "Red Top Road".

I worked with the Town Clerk to select appropriate paint colors for the new front door of Town Hall. I located several photographs and postcards of Town Hall. The earlier photographs (from the dedication in 1952) were black and white and the postcards were not exact color reproductions, but we've settled on a color scheme that represents the best of both.

I participated in a meeting of the 250Rev War Committee and served as an advisor on the UCGS Ulster history round table meeting.

Feb 10th - The Town of Lloyd Police have joined a live-saving program called “File of Life” for our Town of Lloyd residents. Town of Lloyd Police will be giving away “File of Life” kits free to town of residents (2 per household). These kits are designed to make the difference between life and death by providing absolutely vital information to first responders. Medical emergencies can happen anytime. When they do, there is confusion, panic and urgency. First responders arrive on the scene with no information about the person in need. Seconds count – they can make the difference between life and death. Everyone should receive prompt, quality medical care, especially when it matters most – in an emergency.

The “File of Life” kit is easy to use to record a person’s latest medical information including allergies, medication, contact persons and more, all in one safe place. The kits are immediately recognized by first responders nationwide. Lloyd Police hope that by supplying these kits to our town residents that we can improve emergency medical care, provide peace of mind for individuals and their loved ones, and possibly save countless lives. Any town resident who wishes a kit can come to the police station and receive one for free.

February Progress Report

Water Department

1. River water is making up 90% of daily production, the remaining 10% comes from the wells.
2. Production time is averaging 12 Hrs. per day.
3. Work on the backwash tank, update.

Road Crew

1. Repaired a water main break on Van Wagner Road. The older cast-iron main failed, deterioration, shift in the road bed, pipe hammer. (?) It took a three man crew nearly 12 Hrs. to make the repair, a four foot section of water main needed to be replaced.
2. The crew continues increased monitoring of the town’s sewer pump stations.

Sewer Department

1. Daily operations continue as usual, the cooler temps have settled the wastewater plant and have helped with daily processing.
2. The crew has been working on inside projects, building needed storage racks, reorganizing, and inventorying items.
3. Paul Frasch is cross training at the water plant.

Discussion of Sewer Laterals and the Homeowners responsibility. Littman discussed items that should not be flushed down the toilet.

“WHEREAS, on February 27, 2023, representatives of the Town and the Town of Lloyd Police Benevolent Association, Inc., affiliated with the New York State Union of Police Associations, Inc. (hereinafter “NYSUPA”) on behalf of the members of the bargaining unit agreed in principle to a Memorandum of Agreement to create a five-year successor Collectively Negotiated Agreement effective January 1, 2020 and terminating on December 31, 2024, to the one which expired on December 31, 2019; and

WHEREAS, on February 27, 2023, the members of the PBA bargaining unit, ratified the January 1, 2020 – December 31, 2024 MOA between the PBA and the Town, and Town Board ratification and approval of the Memorandum of Agreement is required; and

Local Law A - 2023

Adopting a Proposed Amendment to the Town of Lloyd Zoning Map and Code to Establish a Planned Residential Retirement Development (“PRRD”) District

March 1, 2023

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article 10 of the Town of Lloyd Zoning Code (“Zoning Code”) the Town of Lloyd Town Board (“Town Board”) seeks to amend the Zoning Map and Code to establish a PRRD as set forth in the attached copy of Local Law 3 of 2023 (“Proposed Amendment”); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Zoning Code § 100-23.2, the Town of Lloyd Town Board (the “Town Board”) received an application from The Villages in the Hudson Valley, LLC for a proposed PRRD to be constructed on lands situated on NYS Route 9W in the Town of Lloyd, Ulster County, New York (the “PRRD”); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Zoning Code § 100-23.2(B)(5), the Town Board referred the application to the Town of Lloyd Planning Board (the “Planning Board”) for a recommendation and also to serve as SEQRA lead agency for the environmental review of the PRRD, since the Planning Board will be responsible for site plan review of the proposed PRRD; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Board conducted a thorough review of the proposed PRRD under the State Environmental Quality Review Act and its implementing regulations in 6 NYCRR Part 617 (collectively, “SEQRA”) and, on December 1, 2022, approved a resolution issuing a SEQRA Negative Declaration concluding that

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the adoption of the proposed PRRD, a Type 1 SEQRA action, will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts and, therefore, no further SEQRA review is required; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Zoning Code, on December 1, 2022 the Planning Board recommended the adoption of the proposed PRRD based on its SEQRA Negative Declaration and review of the proposed PRRD, making findings based on the considerations set forth in Zoning Code § 100-23.2(A)(6); and

WHEREAS, the Town Board referred the proposed PRRD to the Ulster County Planning Board pursuant to General Municipal Law § 239-m and received a favorable review of the Proposed PRRD with some advisory comments appropriate for consideration by the Planning Board during site plan review; and

WHEREAS, the proposed PRRD is consistent with the Town of Lloyd Comprehensive Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board has considered the factors set forth in Zoning Code § 100-23.2(A)(6) in relation to the proposed PRRD and adopts the attached December 1, 2022 findings of the Planning Board based on those factors as its own; and

WHEREAS, as required by Zoning Code § 58, notice of a public hearing was published in the official newspaper of the Town at least ten days prior to a public hearing on the Proposed Amendments; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board has held a public hearing on proposed PRRD and the Board has considered all written and oral public comments related to the proposed PRRD. The hearing was closed on February 15, 2023.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

1. Proposed Local Law #3 of 2023 amending the Town of Lloyd Zoning Map and Zoning Code to establish the proposed PRRD is hereby adopted pursuant to Zoning Code § 58; and
2. Advisory comments from the Ulster County Planning Board shall be referred to the Planning Board for consideration during site plan review of the proposed PRRD; and
3. A copy, summary or abstract of the Proposed Amendments shall be published by the Town Clerk as required by NYS Town Law § 265; and
4. Pursuant to Municipal Home Rule Law § 27, the Proposed Amendments shall become effective upon their filing with the New York Secretary State; and
